A Look into a

Volunteer Fire Department

A Brief History

The days of just putting put out the fire is no longer. Volunteer firefighting has become so much more. The Cridersville Volunteer Fire Department was established in 1856. It was the time of the bucket brigade as towns people would fight fires by passing buckets filled with water to one another and throwing it onto the flames. The village's first fire department came in 1890 when the village built a town hall on West Main Street facing Gay Street that would have space for a fire pumper. The hand pumper would be the fire departments biggest piece of equipment to protect and serve the community manned by a group of volunteers. These men gave of their time to ensure the safety of others. Over the years the volunteer fire department grew in manpower and equipment. Between 1951-53 a new fire station was constructed at 100 East Main Street which is the current location of the Cridersville Volunteer Fire Department. Today there are 42 members on the department. Training to become a volunteer fire fighter takes many hours requiring time away from families. It takes a dedicated person and an understanding family to be a volunteer fire fighter. Fire Chief Rick Miller says anyone fighting fires does so on a volunteer basis according to their bylaws. The departments 12 paramedics do get a small compensation for medical runs. The department is an incorporated private entity that the village contracts with for fire and EMS services. A levy voted on by residents provides the funds for the contract and equipment. There are currently 9 vehicles housed at the department including 2 ambulances and 7 firefighting units. A far cry from a bucket brigade and a hand pumper. Thank you to all our members of the Cridersville Volunteer Fire Department for your dedication and selflessness to keep us safe.
